SESSION 6

Based on Episode 6 | Father Michael

Synopsis of the Episode

Fr Michael's flashbacks build to an unbearable point and he decides that he will resign as a Priest after his mother's death. In the midst of this, he tries to help Roz's children cope in the aftermath of their mother's death. Chloe, overwhelmed with anger, took a sledge hammer to the gambling machines that caused her mother's debt. The betting shop manager forgave her but she then did it again. Fr Michael, worried that she would be arrested but agreeing with her anger incites his parishioners to smash the machines too. At Vernon's inquest, Andrew decides to tell the truth about what happened and Fr Michael also confesses that he had heard Helen's message. Fr Michael's mother dies and at her funeral many of the people whom he had helped thank him for what he had done.

Suggested Bible Passage

John 2.13-16

Justice and Forgiveness

In this episode, Fr Michael links justice firmly with forgiveness saying that he would not forgive people who do not ask to be forgiven or who are lying to cover up what they have done. He says: 'First give me truth and justice and I will think about forgiveness'.

- Do you think there can ever be forgiveness without justice?
- What happens to people who never receive justice? Will they ever be able to forgive?

Righteous Anger (again)

In a return of the theme of righteous anger from last week, Fr Michael declared Chloe's anger to be 'righteous' and even encouraged his parishioners to join her in her campaign.

- What did you decide about righteous anger last week?
- Have you changed your mind at all this week?

- Do you think Fr Michael was right, wrong, or a little bit of both?
- Is there anything that makes you as angry as the betting machines made him?

It's a Wonderful life?

In Sarah Hughes' review of Broken in Guardian, she called this series 'TV's unmissable answer to It's a Wonderful Life.' She explains that, though much grittier than the iconic Christmas film, Fr Michael discovers the ways he has touched so many lives.

- Do you agree?
- What lessons have you learned as a result of your reflections on this series?

A Good Ending?

Some people loved the ending to the series; others felt that at the end it parted from it's usual gritty style and produced a 'happy ever after' ending.

What do you think? Was it the right ending or not?
